

PRAYER

- L: Let us read together the Word of God, which shows forth our duty, the source of our strength, and the valor of those who have laid the foundations upon which we build.
- L: Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God is one Lord.
- P: And thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might. (*Deuteronomy 6:4, 5*)
- L: And the Lord said, Ye shall be holy: for I the Lord your God am holy.
- P: And thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself: I am the Lord.

L He hath showed thee what is good.

L:

- P: What doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God? (Micah 6:8)
- L: I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills. From whence cometh my help?
- P: My help cometh from the Lord, which made heaven and earth.
- He will not suffer thy foot to be moved; he that keepeth thee will not slumber. L:
- P: Behold, he that keepeth Israel shall neither slumber nor sleep.
- L: The Lord is thy keeper; the Lord is thy shade upon thy right hand.
- P: The sun shall not smite thee by day, nor the moon by night.
- The Lord shall preserve thee from evil: he shall preserve thy soul. P: The Lord shall preserve thy going out and thy coming in from this time forth, and even forevermore. (Psalm 121)
- L Let us now praise famous people, and those that begot us.
- P: The Lord manifested in them great glory, even his mighty power from the beginning.
- L Such as did bear rule, and were renowned for their power, giving counsel by their understanding.
- Leaders of the people by their counsels, and scholars for the people; P: wise were the words of their instruction:
- L: Such as sought out musical tunes, and set forth verses in writing:
- P: Richly furnished with ability, living peaceably in their habitations.
- L: All these were honored in their generations, and were a glory in their days.
- P: They have left a name behind them, to declare their praises.
- L: And some there be, which have no memorial:
- P: But these were people of mercy, whose righteous deeds have not been forgotten.
- L: All will declare their wisdom.
- P: And the congregation telleth out their praise.
- L: The memorial of virtue is immortal.
- P: Because it is known with us and with God. (Sirach 44)
